A place to share your travels and Public Art you have seen

In September Mike and I visited Sydney and played tourists for 10 days. On one of the many ferry trips we took, we discovered the Manly Gallery which was showing a very diverse and interesting exhibition. Here are a few of the pieces.



Effervese:

Lisa Cahill

Kiln fired reclaimed window glass

Made from window glass salvaged from the artist's childhood home, the work reclaims discarded material to reflect on memory, impermanence and the passage of time



Kin:

Maddison Gibbs Wing

Birchwood, gumnuts, adhesive.

This work honors the sacred relationship between Aboriginal People and eucalyptus trees, living ancestors and cultural custodians.



Bird land washy whale party: Meagan Pelham

Ink, guache, acrylic and pen



End of Empire: Donna Marcus

This work is comprised of found teapots, branded Empire, gleaned from shelves and recycling bins of opportunity shops during the 1990 and 2000's. They are banded together into a new zoomorphic form that ascends the gallery wall.



Empty: Lori Pensini

Lesser bottlebrush nut and seed. Jarrah bark, fine bone china, stainless steel, kangaroo hide.

Th artists family ran out of water in the driest period on record. This work is a response to the despair experienced at not being able to save bushland and animals.



Maku (Witchety Grub) Dereks story:

Derek Jungarrayi Thompson

This is Derek's Grandmothers story, when the Maku was finished, people sang to the Maku to make them come back. They sang and danced and scattered leaves to make them come out of the ground.





Saint Bob and The Swifts:

Jane Theau and Ramji Ambrosuissen

Digital print on linen, parts hand embroidered in cotton thread.

Bob Brown has dedicated his life to saving wild places. This photo was taken last year when he was arrested for protesting the felling of old growth forests in the Styx valley. The massive centuries old tree he is standing on, was the breeding habitat of the endangered Swift parrot.

Anne Nginyanhnka Thompson

This is a story of how life was before. There were no problems then, people were happy, they were connected as families. Everyone looked after the animals and the environment. People don't have that anymore.

Mixed media assemblage

Using child sized teaset pieces landscaped in miniature, the sculptural assemblage mimics a mountainous landscape where the edges of saucers act as paths for tiny people and cups hold protective habitats for animals and birdlife.

Slipcast stoneware with variable treatments in glazing. Lithographic transfers, beeswax and naturally built honeycomb.

Learning how to work with glass has allowed Kam Morgan to create some lovely new innovations in her pottery. Kam came to the Glassies hobby days on Thursdays and learnt how to cut precise shapes from glass using the various tools that CAG has.

By understanding how to work with the glass, she was able to design and make these lovely angels and cute insects so they could have glass wings. The wide variety of glass available really enhances them.

Feel free to drop in to the Glassies Hobby Day on Thursdays 10am - 1pm to see all the different ways glass can be combined with the skills you already have. Our members are also potters and painters so you may see friends you already know - and will certainly make some new ones.

Rules for Use of CAG Kilns

1. Only Members can use kilns.
2. Permission must be sought from Rebecca Tester before use.
3. The user must be experienced in using kilns safely and correctly.
4. The Raku kiln can only be hired and will cost \$50 per day.
5. Users of the Raku kiln must supply their own gas, sawdust and glazing products.

Fergus Stewart Workshop

We had a very successful workshop in November with Fergus Stewart. Fergus has been a potter for over 50 years, he specialises in wood fired salt glazing, which is a pottery decoration process where sodium chloride, ordinary table salt, is introduced into the kiln during the firing process. As the salt is heated, it vaporizes, creating a salty atmosphere that reacts with the clay and glaze. This interaction produces the distinctive orange peel textures and crater-like markings that define salt-glazed pottery. This technique is only applicable in high-fire gas



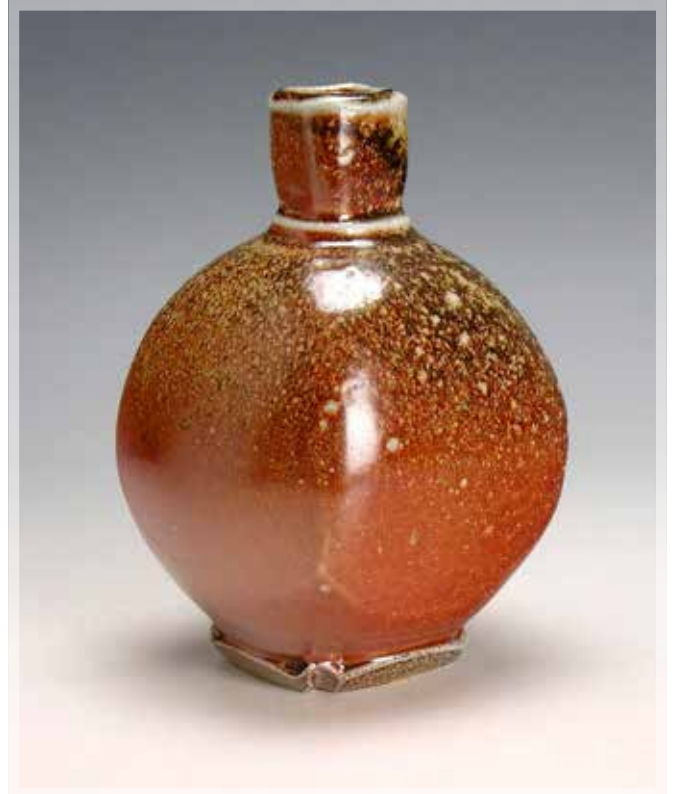
or wood-fired kilns that can reach temperatures over 1260 C. The superheated, salt-infused atmosphere adds unparalleled depth and vibrancy to the pottery.

Fergus demonstrated a wide variety of forms on the first day, mugs, bowls, jugs, teapots, jars with lids, lemon squeezers and stretched platters, he trimmed and finished them all on the next day.

It was fascinating to watch him work so fluently and accurately with so much skill. I think everyone thoroughly enjoyed the workshop and came away with lots of tips and ideas to apply to their own work.

Beneath a Skarlet Sky

Based on the true story of a forgotten hero, *Beneath a Skarlet Sky* is the triumphant, epic tale of one young man's incredible courage and resilience during one of history's darkest hours.

Pino Lella wants nothing to do with the war or the Nazis. He's a normal Italian teenager—obsessed with music, food, and girls—but his days of innocence are numbered. When his family home in Milan is destroyed by Allied bombs, Pino joins an underground railroad helping Jews escape over the Alps, and falls for Anna, a beautiful widow six years his senior.

In an attempt to protect him, Pino's parents force him to enlist as a German soldier—a move they think will keep him out of combat. But after Pino is injured, he is recruited at the tender age of eighteen to become the personal driver for Adolf Hitler's left hand in Italy, General Hans Leyers, one of the Third Reich's most mysterious and powerful commanders.

Now, with the opportunity to spy for the Allies inside the German High Command, Pino endures the horrors of the war and the Nazi occupation by fighting in secret, his courage bolstered by his love for Anna and for the life he dreams they will one day share.

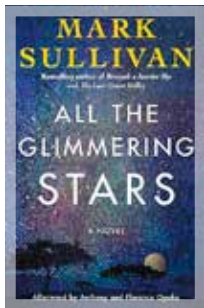
to protect "pure-blood" Germans?

Inspired by a true story, two teens kidnapped by an African warlord find salvation through love in a powerful and healing historical novel.

Anthony Opoka and Florence Okori are coming of age in Uganda in the 1990s. Outstanding

students, they believe in being good humans before they are kidnapped and forced into the fanatical Lord's Resistance Army.

In a legion of young recruits, no one gets closer than Anthony to powerful messianic warlord Joseph Kony and his darkest secrets. To stay sane as he spirals through chaos, Anthony clings to his childhood lessons about being a good human.

Florence's upbringing grounds her too, helping her keep her dreams alive even as she's pulled deeper into the insanity of Kony's war. At the lowest points of their lives, certain they'll never go home, Anthony and Florence meet by chance, fall in love, and begin to dream of surviving their captivity.

They devote their lives to helping their fellow child soldiers escape bondage and return to their families and redemption by following the stars. By turns tender, shocking, moving, desperate, and ultimately triumphant, Florence and Anthony's story is an epic drama of humanity, a life-affirming tale, and an experience readers will never forget. until she can become a greyhound trainer, with dogs of her very own.

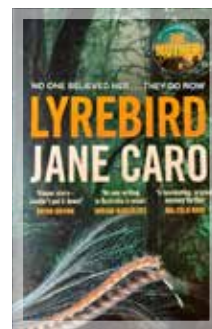

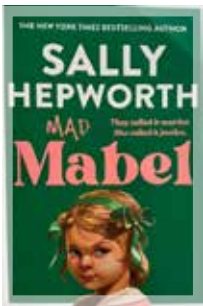
Twenty years later, a body is unearthed, just where Jessica said it would be.

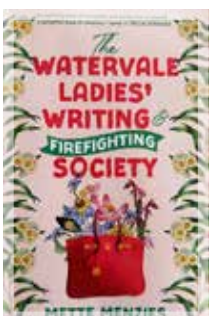

the town's only solicitor, or watch the opportunity slip away. Setting up shop in the Beechwood Cafe, Tilly braces for a brief detour, but life in Watervale Downs soon proves to be anything but simple.

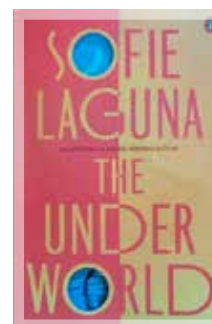
Drawn into the orbit of three very different women – fierce matriarch Bev Jackson, fallen TV star Fenna de Vries, and warm-hearted librarian Jane Robertson – Tilly unexpectedly finds herself joining a local writing group and training with the country fire service. Slowly, friendships form, long-held secrets surface, and the rhythms of country life begin to change her in ways she didn't anticipate.

As the season turns and challenges mount, each woman finds herself at a crossroads. Bev must confront a past she has kept hidden for sixty years, Fenna must decide whether she is ready to stop running, Jane must summon the courage to reimagine her future, and Tilly must ask whether the life she has built is truly the one she wants. And in the meantime, bushfire season is approaching and a day of reckoning is coming for them all.

I liked the premise of this story as it told of a woman who changes her life around completely. But the authors (yes, there's two of them), lost me when the main character had to meet an amazingly beautiful man who was perfect in every way before she could implement that change. A nice little story but a little too much saccharine for my liking. (Goodreads)

Until things go wrong.

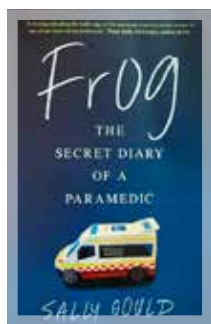
How will Martha find her way in the world where she cannot be herself? Will she ever find a home for the love she feels?

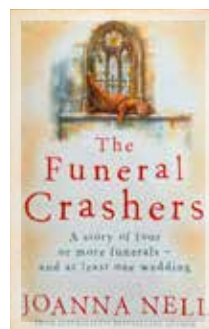
breaking reality of life as a paramedic.

Life as a paramedic, writes Sally Gould in this candid, witty memoir, can be traumatic, gross, dull, hilarious, magical. To make the cut, you need to be able to think outside the square, keep calm in the midst of chaos, be in possession of a strong stomach, and simply brush it off when patients die. That's on top of having a profound understanding of the human body, plus the skills to counter its failings. It also helps to have a highly developed and oftentimes dark sense of humour.

Sally Gould tells of her journey as a paramedic. It's an eye opening story and reveals what paramedics face in their daily lives and their frustration with people who unnecessarily clog up the system. Sally is candid about the effect of the job on her and that is heart wrenching. (Goodreads)

Recently bereaved Grace Cavendish spends her days helping out at All Souls Church, making it her mission to drown out the Reverend Rod's tone-deaf hymn-singing and give each funeral recipient a hearty send-off. Yet the peace she craves remains elusive despite the comforts offered by psychic medium Rhondda and her eight-year-old son, Hudson.

When Martin and Grace meet and bond at an All Souls service, they unwittingly set off a chain of events with far-reaching consequences. They become funeral crashers. But who could have predicted that crashing funerals might have such life-changing and life-affirming outcomes?

Yes cooking IS an art form

This is a place to share your favourite recipes

Nanna's Sponge

Ingredients

3/4 C sugar

4 eggs

Put 1.5 tblsp custard powder in a cup, fill rest of cup with cornflour and a pinch of salt

1 tsp cream of tartar (heaped)

1/2 tsp bi-carb soda

1/2 tsp golden syboiling water

Method

- Heat oven to 160C
- Beat eggs and sugar for about 10 mins until thick and creamy
- Mix golden syrup with the boiling water
- Sift dry ingredients 3 times
- Add golden syrup/water mixture and dry ingredients to the mixture and fold in gently.
- Put in 2 sponge tins or one large tin
- Cook 30 mins

Date and Ginger Slice

Ingredients

155gms dates

125 gms butter

1/3 C sugar

125 gms of preserved ginger

3 cups of corn flakes



Method

Cook dates, chopped ginger, butter and sugar in pan over medium heat until soft

Take off heat add cornflakes and mix well

Press into a lined 18 x 28cm tin and refridgerate until cold

Choc Topping

125gm drinking chocolate

125gm copha

Melt copha over low heat, remove and stir in chocolate, stir until smooth.
