ANNUAL EXHIBITION THE ART OF EXCELLENCE

This year we will be holding our annual exhibition, entitled The Art of Excellence, which will be held in the Painters' Hall between Friday 1 December and Sunday 17 December, the same duration as the Christmas Sale of Work

All members are invited to enter. There will be a People's Choice Award but no judging. All hand created artwork may be entered including painting, drawing, ceramics, glasswork, jewellery, textiles, mixed media, metalwork, woodwork, etc. Photography/digital art is excluded.

CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

- 1 Two entries per person will be accepted, space permitting. Entry is free.
- 2 Entry forms must be delivered to CAG by 1pm Friday 24 November.
- 3 Delivery of artworks to CAG: Thursday 30 November: Hanging works 9.30-10.30am; non-hanging works 10.30-11.30
- All 2-D works must be well-presented and fitted with an appropriate hanging device. Size must not exceed 90cm x 90cm. All work must be labelled with the artist's name, title of artwork, medium and price (if for sale).
- All 3-D works must be well-presented, must not weigh more than 25 kg and measure no greater than 90cm x 90cm x 90cm. All work must be labelled with the artist's name, title of artwork, medium and price (if for sale).
- 6 Groups may be entered as long as they conform to overall size requirements.
- You may include a statement of up to 200 words with your artwork. This statement should be on plain white paper or card measuring no more than 21cm x 15cm.
- 8 Works may or may not be for sale. A commission of 20% will be charged on all sales.
- 9 Delivery, collection and insurance are the responsibility of the artist. All reasonable care will be taken but no responsibility for loss or damage is accepted by CAG.
- 10 All work must be collected on Sunday 17 December between 1-4pm.
- 11 The artist agrees to allow any work to be reproduced for CAG promotional or advertising purposes. Copyright remains the property of the artist.
- All entrants are required to undertake gallery supervision duty and assist as required.

Gooseberry and chocolate is emerging from the wine wait on, a floral character is starting to combine.


Have I described it well enough, I wonder what they think or should we take the bottle and pour it down the sink.


Funnily enough, I never do any ceramics there, choosing to come to CAG and have been doing studies at North Metropolitan TAFE this year.



Visit to Polish Handmade Pottery factory

I have recently visited my son who lives in Poland and while there celebrated my birthday. My surprise gift was a visit and tour of Bolestawiec, a local pottery factory, which produces an amazing variety of work. At the end of our tour, we were given pieces to decorate which they later fired in the kilns and delivered to my son.

The tour covered all processes – clay mixing, mould making, slipware, quality control, bisque firing, hand decorating and glazing.

The most amazing process was their decorating area. Each piece of pottery is done by hand. All patterns have an image template set on a grid, showing position, angle and colour of the pattern. Foam stamps are used to build the image on the surface. A clear glaze goes on top.

There were one hundred and ten women silently decorating by stamping images onto each piece of bisque ware. New workers in this area worked on a month's trial, practicing the same simple image every day. The learners' pieces were inspected and washed clean to use again. Most of the women had worked in decorating for many years.

We started with mixing coloured stains into white porcelain balls to get a coloured pallet.

Fleur commenced doing a demonstration using the coloured porcelain to make a house.

With her great knowledge and wonderful imagination it all looks so easy, but all of us found out how difficult it was with the thin layers that you use to build the house once we started.

It is patience and knowing when the porcelain has firmed up enough to join the pieces together and the decoration that she does to make it so unique.

We stopped and had lunch and enjoyed chatting and enjoying everyone's company, we had been concentrating for so long it was nice to relax for a little while.

Once lunch was over we couldn't wait to get back to finish our houses and put some individual designs on them, the time was going so fast and we still had so much work to do on them, Fleur was making a mug and showing us how to do eyes which looked great.

It was a great day but porcelain is a lot different so it takes patience with joining pieces together and waiting for the porcelain to get to a certain firmness to build your work.

A lot of us didn't finish our house on the day so we were all doing them on Hobby day.













I must say it has taken me a few weeks to finish the house and the bird. Although it is slow and time consuming there has been a few members still playing with the porcelain on Hobby Day.

I hope we can get another workshop next year with Fleur and maybe do animals .

I personally enjoyed it and learnt another area of pottery using a different material and the way of using it making wonderful interesting work. I hope all the other students in the class enjoyed it as well.

The serenity of Cinnamon Gardens is threatened by malignant forces more interested in what makes this refuge different rather than embracing the calm companionship that makes this place home to so many. As those who challenge the residents' existence make their stand against the nursing home with devastating consequences, our characters are forced to reckon with a country divided.

Chai Time at Cinnamon Gardens is about family and memory, community and race, but is ultimately a love letter to story-telling and how our stories shape who we are. (Goodreads)

If only he was there.


Jimmy soon learns that even when you get things right, everything can still go wrong. This is a very interesting exploration of breathing.



And it has another, more sinister claim to fame: the still-unsolved disappearance of young Evelyn McCreery nineteen years ago.

Mina McCreery's life has been defined by the intense public interest in her sister's case--which is still a hot topic in true-crime chat rooms and on social media. Now an anxious and reclusive adult, Mina lives alone on her family's sunbaked destocked sheep farm.

Enter Lane Holland, a young private investigator who dropped out of the police academy to earn a living cracking cold cases. Before she died, Mina's mother funded a million-dollar reward for anyone who could explain how Evelyn vanished from her bed in the family's farmhouse. The lure of cash has only increased public obsession with Evelyn and Mina--but yielded no answers.

Lane wins Mina's trust when some of his more unconventional methods show promise. But Lane also has darker motivations, and his obsession with the search will ultimately risk both their lives--and yield shocking results.

Compulsively readable, with an unforgettable setting and cast of characters, Wake is a powerful, unsparing story of how trauma ripples outward when people's private tragedies become public property, and how it's never too late for the truth to come out.


