









You have to walk at your own pace to enjoy it.


I am considering doing another walk so the experience hasn't put me off at all.



I took so many photos of the coast that I think I could put them all together and I would have a complete pictorial of the Cape to Cape coast




















Festival: Banksy



Painter, printmaker and CAG teacher, Bridget Seaton is excited to present her solo show, Transitions at Zig Zag Gallery, Kalamunda from 29 July - 27 August. This aptly coincides with the 25th anniversary of the Bibbulmun track whose terminus is located just metres away from the gallery. She is a keen bushwalker and many of the artworks in her exhibition feature places she has spent time in whilst walking on the track. The exhibition showcases a new body of work and embodies her desire to amalgamate viewpoints and to describe the subtle transitions in landscapes often only noticed when traveling on foot. Her unique prints which are a combination of mixed printmaking techniques and collage, explore her favourite subject matter of trees. In addition to her acrylic paintings and framed prints she will have a wall of accordion plein air sketchbooks on display. These sketchbooks tell the story behind the paintings and capture her direct experiences of time spent painting in the bush. This is Bridget's second solo show and she invites everyone to the opening night on 28 July at 6pm

and was continually ticking away until it got to 1200 degrees where we started reducing, which is when we close off the chimney and the kiln inside starts looking for the oxygen by getting the oxygen out of the pots and flames start flashing out of the chimney. Once this appears we gradually increase the gas for the temperature to start increasing again and pushing the vent in slowly until the temperature rises until the cones go over in the kiln, which you see through the bung in the door when the temp reaches 1280 degrees This has been reached after we soaked the kiln for 25mins. The firing was finished by 7-30 PM.

Rebecca then sealed the kiln with the firing finished and all those pottery pieces left glowing through the night in the kiln.

We decided to unpack the kiln the following Tuesday as it is Hobby Day and many members would be at the Art Centre to watch Rebecca crack the kiln and see all the treasures in there.

Everyone was excited to see their pots inside the kiln with the many colours and reactions to the reduction results.

Rebecca unloaded the kiln and everyone inspected their pots and checked out everyone else's as well.

The potters were very happy and the firing was a great success, now members and students will have to get busy making pots for their next firing and trying different glazes, we are all looking forward to the next firing.








Go as a River

in a family of troubled men.







In her first book, Margareta Magnusson shared with the world the practical Swedish tradition of d st dning, or 'death cleaning' - clearing out unnecessary belongings so others don't have to do it for you. Now, unburdened by baggage (emotional and actual), she is

able to focus on what makes each day worth living, and reveals her discoveries about growing older - some difficult to accept, and many rather wondrous. She reflects on her idyllic childhood on the west coast of Sweden, the fullness of her life with her husband and their five children, and learning how to live alone. Throughout, she offers advice on how to age gracefully, such as- don't be afraid to wear stripes, don't resist new technology, and let go of what doesn't matter.

As with death-cleaning, it's never too early to begin. The Swedish Art of Ageing Well shows us how to prepare for and understand the ageing process, and the joys and sorrows it can bring. While Margareta still recommends downsizing and decluttering (your loved ones will thank you!), her ultimate message is that we should not live in fear of death, but rather focus on appreciating beauty, connecting with our loved ones, and enjoying our time together.




umph and tragedy: of his daring escape from penal servitude in Australia; how he became America's most celebrated boxer; and how he met the true love of his life. (Amazon)

Josie de Bray, aka Madam Monnier, aka Marie Louise Monnier, was a brothel madam who owned most of Roe Street, Perth from WWI up to the 1940s. A returned soldier tried to shoot her dead in her brothel in 1917 and her 'bungalow' was at the centre of underworld violence in the 1920s. She

returned to France before WWII to visit family and was bombed repeatedly out of homes there and captured by the Germans. She was a prisoner of war and one story has her in a concentration camp. She survived, returned to Perth in 1947, and took up business again in Roe Street, having made a fortune from the rent collected from her brothels while she was a prisoner of war, up until her death in 1953. Can her clients' hard-won wisdom - and the inspiring love story of a spirited old woman named Claudia - show Clover the way to a happy ending?




